see meaning in what you are doing. Perhaps you are just depressed because you see everything, including yourself and all around you, decay over time. Politics is as ugly as it has ever been. Well, that's what we see and it surely can be tough.

While we see and experience many wonderful blessings in life which God has given us, the transitory nature of our life on this earth and the frequent pain and confusion (which happens) can get anyone down from time to time.

One day I was driving through the beautiful fields of Lancaster County on a magnificent day. The sun was shining in a bright blue sky and the temperature was enjoyably mild. The cows and animals occupied the fields. The creek gently flowed. It was a perfect day.

Suddenly all the problems of life occurred to me and the thought of people dying began to haunt me so that even though the sky was bright, a dark cloud seemed to cover everything in my mind. I began to panic and was afraid.

I arrived at my destination and greeted the people I was visiting and all was clear. I was brought back to hope.

When Martin Luther was hiding in a castle in the woods from those who wanted to kill him, he said that he was beset by demons. As he prayed the Name of Jesus, his

fears dispelled and disappeared just like the smoke and mist did from the Thuringian hills in the distance on that day in medieval Germany.

My purpose in this article is to inform you that there is hope, that God loves you, although the **appearances are often to the contrary**. The trick is that there is no pamphlet, doctrine or sermon which will convince you of this. Faith in God is a gift from God. "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God- not the result of works, so that no one may boast."

-Ephesians 2: 8

There is hope because God, who is eternal and all powerful, loves you despite all the turmoil which we experience. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." - John 3: 16. This is the meaning of Christmas.

One of the problems is that no one can explain this no matter how long we study Scripture. There is much mystery in our relationship with God. Martin Luther used to say, "That which is above is none of our business" and talked about the "hidden" nature of God in the Cross of Christ even though God is revealed in Jesus and the Word. At the end of time all will be revealed. Until then, we walk in faith.

The best way to acquire faith is to pray that God bless you with it. Be on the look out for those whom God sends to you to be **messengers of hope** in your life. Don't be blind and deaf when God sends you a message. Maybe it's an article in the paper, maybe it's a word from a clerk at the grocery store or somewhere where you least expect it. One place you can expect to receive hope is in God's Holy Church. Find a church and go fill up on faith when your tank is empty. Then stick around and share some of that endless hope with someone else who needs to hear it. Believe it or not, probably a lot of people are more hopeless than even you! Many times God uses the once hopeless to be messengers of hope for others.

Beware of associating with people who think they have God all figured out. These folks are dangerous. In order to have a real faith we have to acknowledge our real doubts. One of my favorite verse in Scripture is I Thessalonians 4: 13, in which we

learn that we are to "grieve but not as people without hope." Paul understands that we grieve. It's alright to grieve. Even Jesus wept in John 11: 35 at the death of Lazarus just prior to raising him from the dead. You and I are certainly not as strong as Jesus. So go ahead and cry! Paul tells us, however, that we have hope even though we hurt. Again, no one can explain this. Yet this is the teaching and belief of the Holy Church and it is something for you to hold on to today even though you might have no clue that such a wonderful thing could happen to you.

Pray to God; or as Luther said, "Pray, let God worry." Pray the Name of Jesus and your fears will fade like mist on the hills. God loves you and so does God's Holy Church. You were not created to die but to live in the Holy Spirit of God Almighty.



When we say "Merry Christmas" we are really saying, "This and every season can be a season of hope in Christ."

Also, it is easy to develop the blues by yourself. You are not alone in Christ. Seek out those whom you trust and who can comfort as well as challenge you. Don't sit around alone moping because then it's much easier for the devil to grab

you by the tail. Everyone, including myself, gets down and discouraged. Through the great power of the Holy Spirit, the wind, the breath of God which created life itself (Genesis) and continues to sustain us today, we live forever like the wind.

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him....The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it...He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him." - John 1: 1-3a, 5, 10

Hymn of the Month for December

"Joy to the World"

The accidental Christmas hymn

According to church history, Isaac Watts was one of the most prolific and celebrated creators of hymns. However, his most famous creation, "Joy to the World" was born of coincidence, rather than desire. In 1719, Watts published The Psalms of David a collection of poems where each verse was based on a psalm. But, instead of translating the original texts of the "Old Testament," he made some subtle adjustments. His poems referred more explicitly towards the works of Jesus, thus seeking inspiration from the New Testament.



The majority of the hymns of <u>The Psalms of David</u> have now fallen into obscurity, except for the second part of "Psalm 98." Ironically, the poet had no intention of creating a Christmas carol when he composed the verse. However, in 1836, Lowell Mason composed a riveting melody for this second part and combined with its popularity in the church. "Joy to the World" started its journey into the music stratosphere.

The musical origin of "Joy to the World" is somewhat mystical. Lowell Mason's version remains the most prevalently utilized to date, which was the fourth revised interpretation of the carol. Lowell named it "ANTIOCH," the tune of which is attributed to George Frideric Handel. The choruses of Handel's oratorio, titled "Messiah" shared a chance resemblance with "ANTIOCH." A theme of this musical accompaniment also portrayed an eerie similarity with the orchestral inception of "Comfort ye", a recitative.

Further, the first four notes also bear a striking similarity to the opening of the choruses "Glory to God" and "Lift up your heads", all belonging to the same oratorio. However, this claim has its loose ends, since no autographed score by George Frideric Handel exists. This, added with zero documentary evidence suggesting Handel's involvement offers "ANTIOCH" the benefit of the doubt. In 1986, John Wilson further unearthed the fact that the initial publication of "Joy to the World" was in two separate English collections. One of these versions, titled "Comfort" is dated back to 1833. This again creates a theory excluding Lowell Mason from the list of the composer, as his first version is dated three years after.

Although Isaac Watts is well appreciated today, he was considered to be a black sheep back in his time. He severely disturbed the status quo of his contemporary musical culture and was also termed as a heretic for his lyrics. He grew up in a society that consisted only of sections of scriptures and psalms being incorporated with music. Watts broke this hegemony, as he noticed a certain lack of emotion among the congregants who performed it. He hated this monotonous and dull negligence that was prominent upon the faces of the performers. His father challenged him to do something about this, and eventually, he started tweaking his verses, opening a whole new frontier of possibilities.

Another widespread debate that is most associated with this hymn is its origin as a Christmas carol. Although it clearly depicts the Second Coming of Christ, it doesn't have any trivial connection with the Christmas story. However, contrary to popular opinion, there lies a correlation - a "Second Coming" cannot be manifested without a "First Coming." The piece is all about fulfillment, depicting the notions of a supernatural phenomenon, of what could be achieved from its impact. Similarly, Christmas does not only dwell in the past attainments but also looks forward to the grace that was achieved subsequently. The song proclaims the ultimate joy that is yet to be revealed, establishing a strong connection with the festive period.

The poem in focus was an adaptation of "Psalm 98." The poet interpreted this particular verse to celebrate of the impact of the Almighty on the world. After a century, the second part of this verse was adapted to music, which culminated in one of the most celebrated Christmas carols of all time.



Advent

Although the historical record is sketchy, it appears that our Advent arose out of a season of fasting to prepare for baptisms at Epiphany. By the sixth century, an eschatological emphasis was present. Our Advent comprises the four Sundays before Christmas. Each year, the first Sunday contains the theme of readiness for divine judgment, the second Sunday the ministry of John the Baptist, the third Sunday the Baptist's call to a repentant life and only on the fourth Sunday a narrative concerning the birth of Jesus. God comes, in the past in the history of Israel and the incarnation of Jesus, in the present in the word and sacrament of each Sunday, and in the future at the end of all things. The lectionary appoints readings to fit this pattern, and its tone stands in stark contrast to our society's weeks of preparation for Christmas.

Sausage Pinwheels

An idea for Christmas morning breakfast

Serves: 32 **Prep Time:** 15 minutes

Cook Time: 15 minutes

These pinwheels are quick, easy and only require 4 ingredients.

Ingredients

1 pound pork Sausage

2 (8 ounce) package refrigerated crescent rolls

1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened

1 cup shredded Cheddar Cheese (you can use another flavor of cheese)

<u>Instructions</u>

- 1. Add the sausage to a large skillet over medium high heat. Cook until browned and crumbled, about 10 minutes. Drain the excess grease and set aside.
- 2. Lay out a sheet of wax paper and spray it with cooking spray. Unroll on package of crescent rolls onto the wax paper. Pinch the perforations together to create a seamless sheet of dough.
- 3. Spread half of the softened cream cheese evenly over the dough, leaving a 1/2 -inch border around the edges. Sprinkle half the cooked sausage and half the shredded cheese over the cream cheese.
- 4. Using the wax paper to assist you, carefully roll the dough lengthwise into a log, encasing the filling. Wrap the log tightly in plastic wrap.
- 5. Repeat the process with the remaining ingredients to create a second log.
- 6. Refrigerate the wrapped logs for at least an hour or until they are firm enough to slice.
- 7. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees Fahrenheit. Remove the logs from the refrigerator and unwrap them. Using a sharp knife, cut the logs into ½-inch-thick slices and arrange them on a baking sheet with space in between them.
- 8. Bake the pinwheels in the preheated oven for 10-15 minutes or until they're golden brown.
- 9. Remove the pinwheels from the oven and let them cool slightly before serving. Enjoy!
